Beginning Feb. 1, the Defense Department will calculate imminent-danger pay by the day rather than the month. Up to now, service members received a full month's imminentdanger pay, \$225, for spending even a single day in designated hazardous areas. Troops will get the extra pay only for days they're actually present in the danger zones. The prorated daily amount works out to \$7.50.
